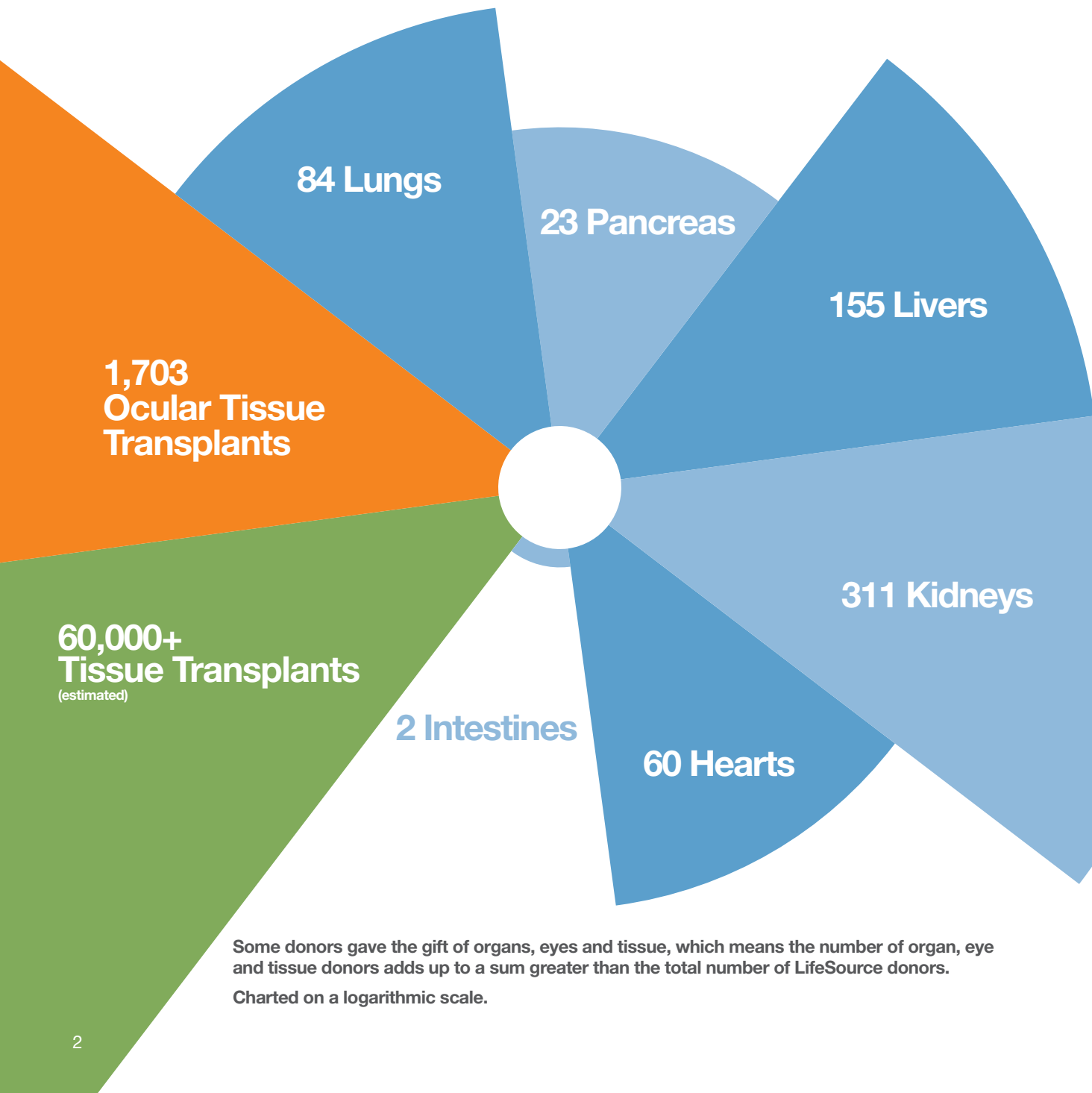
Partnering

to Save Lives

Donation saves and heals thousands of lives each year. It's a gift that relies on the generosity of others—even with the best medicine and technology, transplantation is not possible without one person giving selflessly to another.

Up to 75 lives can be saved and healed by the single decision to be a donor, and yet it takes many organizations to make donation and transplantation happen.

Partnership powers this life-saving work.



Some donors gave the gift of organs, eyes and tissue, which means the number of organ, eye and tissue donors adds up to a sum greater than the total number of LifeSource donors.

Despite these record-breaking successes, 113,127 people waited for the lifesaving gift of a transplant in 2019 and each day 22 people died who were waiting for a transplant. Let's make it zero.

Achieving Milestones:

Setting New Standards

The seemingly limitless energy of the donation and transplantation community was on full display throughout 2019, the 30th anniversary of LifeSource.

Medical advancements, ambassador advocacy, community events and outreach and international leadership were just some of the achievements in the Minnesota, North Dakota and South Dakota region.

Satisfying Donor Family Needs

A survey of 151 donor families conducted last summer by research firm RPG revealed that 88% were “highly satisfied” with the level of compassion, aftercare and other communications from LifeSource. **“I’m more in favor of donation now because of the support we received,”** said one respondent.



Hearing His Daughter's Heartbeat

In June, donor father Mark Little Elk listened to **the heartbeat of his daughter, Jasmine, for the first time since she passed.** Supporting these rare but powerful meetings between donor families and recipients can offer healing for both sides.





Leading International Donation Efforts

As president of ISODP (the International Society for Organ Donation and Procurement), LifeSource founder and CEO Susan Gunderson **led the organization's efforts to improve donation programs worldwide.**

Researching Cardiac Physiology

In instances when a heart is not viable for transplantation, it can be donated for research. LifeSource has a **30-year partnership with the U of M Visible Heart Lab.** Led by researcher Paul Iazzo, PhD, the partnership with Visible Heart has led to pioneering research in cardiac physiology, patient care and medical devices.



Campaigning for Donor Registration

The "Check the Box" campaign became integrated across traditional and digital media. Along with traditional print and outdoor placements, social media and search ads drove nearly 400,000 people to the website and **resulted in nearly 31,500 clicks to register as a donor.** The campaign video reached over 2.3 million views and the publication Modern Healthcare recognized the campaign's efficacy with two awards.



Sowing a Cultural Resource

Shhh... The garden is sleeping. An indigenous medicine garden began taking form at LifeSource headquarters in 2019, and the soil is now resting and being invigorated based on traditional practices. Designed by Francis Bettelyoun of UMN Native American Medicine Gardens, **the new garden will feature plants traditionally used in medicine and ceremonies.** The garden will be a learning resource for Native American communities and foster their connection with LifeSource.

Building Legacy

With the new Legacy Circle program, recognized on the contributor wall, planned giving lets families **carry out their values and inspire a future where everyone shares the gift of life.** Nine families have designated LifeSource in their estate planning and three bequests have been received.



Supporting Donor Families

At the heart of our work is supporting the families of organ, eye and tissue donors **at the time of donation and in the months and years that follow.** In 2019, we helped 1,221 families navigate their journey of grief and healing —a 35% increase over 2018.



Raising The Bar

Regions Hospital served 29 donors in 2019, setting a new record for our three-state region since LifeSource was founded in 1989. The previous record was 27 for total donors in a single year.

Achieving Milestones:

Advancing Donation

Medical advancements have contributed to the increases in organ donation. For example, organs from donors with Hepatitis C or HIV can now be successfully transplanted thanks to effective drug treatments. And in 2019 a former three-time kidney recipient was able to donate their lungs and liver. **Regional transplant centers make these extraordinary donor and recipient matches possible.**



Bringing Organizations Together

The Donate Life Symposium, Spark, took place in October at Mystic Lake Center in Shakopee, Minnesota. The symposium brought together **over 750 attendees from donation and transplantation-related organizations around the nation** for a day of education and inspiration.

RACING FOR LIFE

THE CALL CAME at 11 A.M., three days before Christmas 1986. Marguerite Brown, the donor coordinator for Stanford University Medical Center's transplant program, took it at her desk in the cardiovascular research center. The St. Paul Red Cross had received news of a crib death in Fargo, N.D. The 4-month-old infant's heart had been successfully resuscitated, but the brain had not survived. The family of the infant had given permission for transplantation as long as anonymity was maintained. An official at the Red Cross had punched the blood type, weight and age of the donor into the national computer, and Stanford was up on the screen.

There are stringent criteria for donor heart infant donors are extremely rare. Organs can be planted only when the donor's brain has ceased to function. The majority of these deaths occur in motor vehicle accidents. But it was a chance for Vaughn A. Stanford's transplant program. At noon, Dr. Shumway, the cardiac transplant surgeon, had received news of a crib death in Fargo, N.D. Marguerite had been successfully resuscitated, but the brain had not survived. The family of the infant had given permission for transplantation as long as anonymity was maintained. An official at the Red Cross had punched the blood type, weight and age of the donor into the national computer, and Stanford was up on the screen.

On behalf of the Stanford heart team, we would like to thank you for your assistance in providing the aircraft necessary to transport the heart to St. Lukes Hospital in Fargo on December 24, 1986.

As you know we were facing a crisis. Our 4-month-old boy received the heart transplant and is now well and making steady progress.

This child had been suffering from a disease affecting the muscle and was unable to pump blood. His heart rate was measured in the 20s and there are severe shadows on his chest x-rays.

Pioneering Legacy:

The “Heart Flight”

Three years before LifeSource was founded, a series of events took place that demonstrate the generosity, tenacity and “can and will” spirit that define the donation and transplantation community today. The way in which organizations and individuals came together for the Heart Flight in 1986 set a foundation that enabled 2019 to be the best year yet for donation and transplantation.

In July, LifeSource CEO Susan Gunderson joined donor parents Karen and Steve McCann and Brigadier General Robert Becklund at the Fargo Air Museum for a ceremony to open a permanent exhibit about the historic Heart Flight.

On an icy night in December of 1986, the heart of infant donor Michael McCann was to be flown from Fargo to a waiting five-month-old recipient in San Francisco. When the Learjet and its cargo were grounded by the cold, North Dakota Governor George Sinner ordered an Air National Guard F4 fighter jet into action.

At 3:06 a.m., then-lieutenant Robert Becklund took off solo from Fargo with Michael's heart on ice in a cooler strapped into the co-pilot's seat. Just over three hours later, he touched down in San Francisco and handed the heart off to a team from Stanford.

33 years later, recipient Andrew has finished his masters' degree, traveled to 40 countries and speaks five languages—actively working to fulfill his commitment to make the most out of the life he was selflessly gifted.

Engaging the Community:

Events & Fundraising Partners

Throughout the year, dozens of events raised funds, inspired hope and increased awareness about donation and transplantation. Friendly competitions, educational opportunities, emotional tributes—all are meaningful.

In addition to events LifeSource hosted across the region, many events were hosted by the families and friends of donors or transplant recipients.



Connecting with Community

Widening the **message of donation and transplantation throughout the region** is an important part of the LifeSource mission. From outreach work with funeral directors to sponsoring weekend community events, the LifeSource team is a visible and welcoming presence.

Awarding Medals of Honor

North Dakota families whose loved ones gave the gift of life joined LifeSource and the State of North Dakota for a special recognition ceremony with Governor Bergum. **Each family was presented with a Donor Medal of Honor** after a short welcome by the Governor.

Fundraising in the Community

An annual September event, the Pull for Papa Sporting Clays Tournament brought together friends and family of donor Jim Mueller for friendly competition and to raise funds for donation and transplantation. **Community-motivated annual events like this help raise awareness of the importance of donation and transplantation**—from the Golf Classic to the Dweebs Benefit Concert to Give to the Max Day.

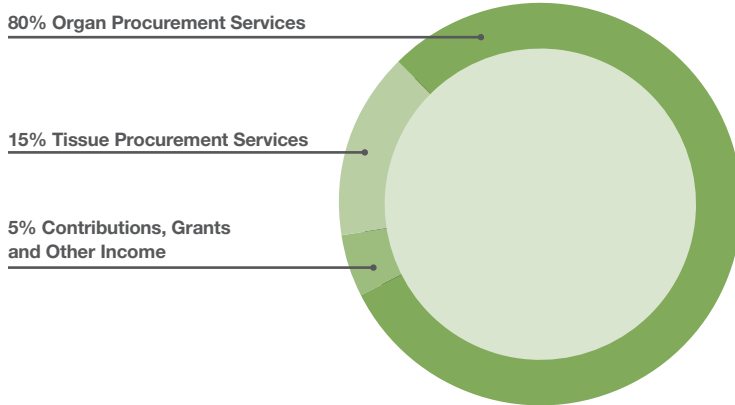


Recognizing Donor Gifts

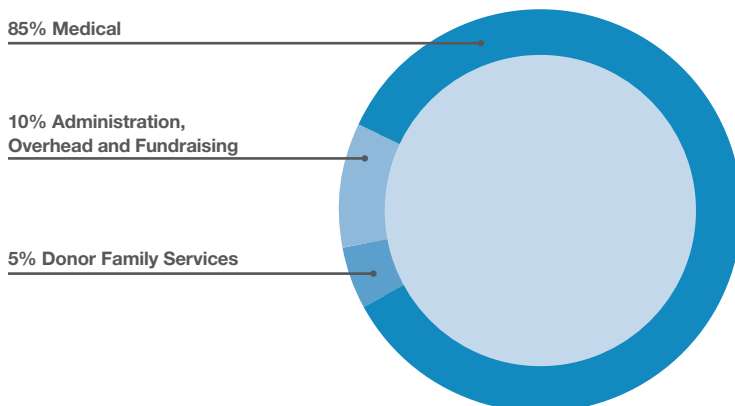
